I trust you are safely settled in Princeton by now (at any rate by the time you receive this letter). I can never thank you enough for taking the time when you were so very busy to show me your wonderful sculpture and the fascinating site of Seleucia (?). Everything worked out well for the trip to Elmali. Ülkü arranged for the taxi, and she and one of the boys and Dr. Laubscher came along. We found the Güterbocks at Elmali, recovering from the very tiring bus trip of the official tour. We all looked at the tombs together. Another taxi with students from Perge came later and saw the Karaburun tomb although they missed Kizilkyi. They had not had enough faith in the weather to arrange ahead of time for a taxi and

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so were late getting started.

On Monday, Machteld Mellish and her whole group of students went with me to Limyra and we saw the Leros and Borchardt's more recent excavations. The fragments of relief from his probable acrotaph of Zeus Caesar really are of outstanding quality and reminiscent of reliefs from the city of Rome. The marble is large-grained. I wonder if it and the sculptors came from Rhodes.

Ülkü also arranged for my taxi to the airport on Tuesday morning and got up early to see me off. She seems to me to be a very fine person as well as a good architect.


