Dr. Albert Schweitzer. . name. Born of poor but refined parents in Alsace, .. father pastor ... childhood a pleasant one of ideal relations with understanding parents. The qualities that were to make his life one of such varied contributions to mankind were revealed .. earliest

childhood.

As little boy of nine...polyphonic choral From a tender age. poignant sympathy with human suffering. He himself once said. "AS far back as I can look into my life I have always suffered so much from the misery I saw in

the world that I have never really felt pure joy in living". There is an incident of a despised Jew who; used to make his way through the village with a donkey cart, etc ... This smile overcame me", says Schweitzer, "from that Jew I learned for the first time what it means to accept persecution silently. He became a great teacher to me. We also hear how his social conscience awoke Fight and meat soup" ...
